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Editor's Column

"Grandfathers are just antique little boys"

I am about to cross my last Rubicon. By the time you read this I will be, or be about to be, a Grandfather for the first time. So December for our household will be more than about just one baby, that Christ child born in Jerusalem all those many years ago.

I have stood a number of times on the Mount of Olives, looked out, and marvelled at how small and domestic the Christmas and Easter stories are. To my right is the Garden of Gethsemane, in front of me the Via Dolorosa and Golgotha, to my left, five miles away, Bethlehem and over sixty miles to the right, beyond Gethsemane, lies Nazareth.

I wonder at the journey that poor family had to make just because the Romans wanted to count heads in a census, and I remember the disaster that befell them, in a world without Expedia or Tripadvisor, of finding nowhere to lay their weary bodies after such a long and tiring walk. And yet they found hospitality and comfort, and received gifts of Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh. I have always wondered about those gifts – why them, and what were they expected to do with Gold?

Travelling around the Yemen some years ago, as a companion to a friend who had been commissioned to write a book on spice, we researched those gifts that are found in abundance in that country which is now so dreadfully ravaged by war. We discovered that to this day all three spices (and there is an academic view that 'gold' was at the time the name of a spice) are given to and used by Yemeni mothers as restoratives immediately after childbirth. And I understood. Even though these spices have many other uses, for me those Wise Men, the Magi, were giving the new Mother gifts to heal and restore her, they were thoughtful and loving presents. They were, if you like, Medicare from the South.

I hope all the BB's readers receive presents given with equal thought and love this Christmas and I also trust that many of you will rally round as we compete with Regent Street and turn on our festive lights on the 5th.

As we head into the new year the village will once again flourish, its two pubs will re-open, a coffee shop is on the horizon and who knows what other delights await Benson in 2020?

So Happy Christmas and New Year to all and thank you for sparing your time to read and nurture the Bulletin in 2019.

Village pubs

Following a brief period when the village had no pubs open, The Three Horseshoes has now reopened. The Crown Inn is now officially owned by Hook Norton Brewery and the provisional start date for refurbishments to the building is 6th January 2020. Chrissy's Country Kitchen will remain open until at least then.

Parishes Against Gravel Extraction (PAGE)

PAGE has announced that the areas that have been put forward for gravel extraction up until 2034 are near Cassington and between Nuneham Courtenay and Oxford.

SG7, the water meadow at Benson and SG13, the large field between Benson and Shillingford have been ruled out permanently for archaeological reasons and other matters. Benson (along with Warborough and Dorchester) no longer needs to contribute to PAGE funds as there is no threat.

Dog Fouling

The Parish office receives continued complaints of dog owners allowing their dogs to foul the footpaths and not pick it up, this is especially a problem along the Littleworth footpath which is very well used by children on their way to and from school. Please keep an eye on what your dog is doing and pick up what it does.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING Parish Hall lounge Tuesday February 18, 2020 at 8pm

At the last AGM in February 1919, those who attended were given a comprehensive account of the reasons why the BB Committee felt the time had come to register as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). This involves an application to the Charity Commission which in turn requires a revised constitution. At that meeting, a draft revised constitution was presented and the Chair, Jill Parrick, pointed out the key differences with the current one. In fact, there were very few substantive changes although the document was set out in a very different way. The meeting agreed that the Bulletin should go forward with an application to the Charity Commission (CC) and the new constitution was agreed without amendment. The application has since been made, although the CC says it is dealing with a high number of applications so it is unclear how long we might have to wait for a response. We will of course let you know via the BB and hope to have some more information by the time of the 2020 AGM.

Grants

The BB's finances are healthy, so we would like to remind all local groups and societies that we would be pleased to consider any applications for "one-off" funding. In the last two financial years ending November 2018 we have made grants totalling £10,000. you an application form. The February 2020 edition of the BB will include information on Committee members standing for election/reelection and also information about where the annual accounts may be viewed.



General Election Restrictions

As you all know, there will be a General Election on 12th December, which means that until then, the District Council is in a period of so-called "purdah", during which it cannot be seen to be taking any action, or making any statements, which could be interpreted as offering support for one political party or another. Normal day-to-day activities of the Council continue, of course, but council staff (officers) must not do anything that could be seen as trying to influence the way residents vote.

As elected Councillors, we are also covered by the purdah rules, which means that this month's report cannot include anything of a "political" nature. We are allowed to use our other communication channels (e.g. Twitter or Facebook) to express our views as individuals, but we may not imply that we are speaking on behalf of the District Council. After the election, we'll be able to write with more information about the local plan and other recently agreed initiatives in these pages.

Councillor Grants

We have both received a number of applications for the Councillor Grant scheme, which closes in early January. So far, we have made contributions for some outdoor fitness equipment in Ewelme, to the redevelopment project at Millstream Day Centre, to the Incredible Edibles project at Benson Library and to the Going Forward bus service. Our funds are starting to run low, but if you know of any community group which needs some help with a project, point them in the direction of www.southoxon.gov.uk/grants to read the rules on eligibility.

Free Parking in the lead-up to Christmas

Drivers in South Oxfordshire can benefit from free parking in district council car parks on certain days in December. This annual free parking tradition is designed to encourage people to shop locally for their Christmas presents. The free parking days allocated to each area are agreed with the individual town councils depending on which day would best suit local traders.

Free Christmas parking days also means people don't have to pay to park if they wish to catch up with friends and family in the pubs, cafés and restaurants during the festive period.

Drivers will be able to park without paying for a ticket in local car parks on the following days next month:

- Wallingford Thursdays (5, 12, 19 December)
 Didcot Mondays (9, 16, 23 December)
 Goring Saturdays (7, 14, 21 December)
 Henley Tuesdays (3, 10, 17 December)

On the above days there's no need to display a ticket. Parking is also free on a Sunday in many of the council-owned town centre car parks in the district, so please check the tariff boards in car parks for further details.




Some of you may have noticed the sizeable steel framework taking shape on the Cala development at Littleworth Road. This is the framework for the new Community Building being provided as part of the development and we have held meetings with Cala to agree the finishes for the building. It is planned that the building works should be completed around the Autumn of 2020.

We have also been in discussion with David Wilson Homes about the green space they plan to provide on the BEN3/4 site. We have asked them to amend their current landscape design to include a community orchard, allotment space and species-rich meadow habitat that will compliment the green spaces managed for nature elsewhere in the village. Discussions are ongoing but it looks promising that our aspirations will be met.

And talking about green spaces, this part of the plan is getting some attention at the moment whilst we work with both Cala and David Wilson Homes. We want all of the new green spaces to connect up, providing habitat that helps wildlife thrive and move around, but are also good places for people to enjoy.

Meanwhile the Transport Team have been investigating the provision of double yellow lines in the lane from the Waterfront Café to Preston Crowmarsh. This follows concerns




about emergency vehicles being unable to gain access. Discussions are continuing with OCC Highways.

Primary Care Networks

There are a lot of changes going on in the NHS as a result of the Long Term Plan that has been devised by NHS England. As reported in October's Benson Bulletin this involves GPs adopting new arrangements at local surgery level whereby Benson, Wallingford and Goring/Woodcote surgeries will come together in a 'Primary Care Network' (PCN). The three surgeries will remain independent of each other, just as they are now, but will collaborate to provide a wider range of services at local level.

In planning these services PCNs will need to involve local community health and care services, including voluntary sector groups and patient representatives, in the design, planning and perhaps delivery of these services.

Every GP surgery in England is supposed to have a Patient Participation Group (PPG) like Benson Patients' Panel. PPGs were not asked at the outset what they think of the idea of PCNs, nor were we invited to help in planning and developing them.

Since 2013 PPGs in Oxfordshire have met together in locality forums set up by Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group (OCCG) and were able to share experiences and put forward our views to OCCG. OCCG has now disbanded these forums. Instead OCCG Chief Executive Lou Patten says "In line with the national Long Term Plan for the NHS, the patient voice at Locality

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
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Forum level now needs to be developed to be more inclusive of our populations and centred around Primary Care Networks...... OCCG has asked Healthwatch Oxfordshire (see last month's Benson Bulletin) to help support this and set up the wider stakeholder network for the system". Despite our lack of involvement in this decision, we will work with Healthwatch Oxfordshire in the hope that the patient voice is heard loud and clear under the new arrangements.

Thanks to the very good relationship that has built up over the last six years between GPs and PPGs in South East Oxfordshire led by John Reid (Benson Patients' Panel chair), we have at least been kept informed about how our local PCNs are developing. It is possible that there will be lots of benefits from a wellfunctioning PCN but equally we need to know what the potential challenges are and what patients feel about them.

Benson Patients' Panel has decided to take the initiative. So by the time this edition of Benson Bulletin is published we will have met with the other two PPGs and the lead GPs in our network to discuss how we can work together and ensure that we get the best out of our PCN. We will let you know all about it in the February issue of the Bulletin.

'READ EASY'

Can you spare 1 hour a week to help an adult with reading difficulties? - some 400,000 people in England lie in this category.

'Read Easy' trains volunteers to teach adults with low reading skills to read (no previous teaching experience required). Sessions are on a 'no pressure' - one to one basis.

We are currently looking for people in this area aged 21 or over – no upper age limit - who can spare 30 minutes, twice a week, to meet with their reader/learner at a neutral venue e.g. local library, and coach them in reading skills. Before you start as a coach, training is given and sessions are structured using easy to follow reading manuals.

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The Davey Consort St Birinus

Immensity cloistered in thy dear womb, Now leaves His well-belov'd imprisonment, There He hath made Himself to His intent Weak enough, now into the world to come; But O, for thee, for Him, hath the inn no room?

Early in November, three regular members of the consort - Sophie, Anastasia and Dominic Bevan – joined Sam Oran and Howard Thompson for a charity concert of Opera and Fizz at St Mary's Church Haddenham.

The concert was in aid of the Syrian Family Project. The project is essentially an endeavour of the whole village to bring a single refugee family from Syria to start afresh in Haddenham. The resettlement comes via the UK government and UN working together. This was the second concert as part of a fundraising project to ensure everything is in place once the family arrives. The singers performed without any fees.

The concert itself included the spine tingling trio Soave sia il vento from "Così fan tutte" and the equally touching finale from the "Marriage of Figaro". Sam gave a spirited rendition of Figaro's famous aria from Rossini's "Barber of Seville" whilst Dominic and Howard gave us a spirited accounted of the tenor/baritone duet from the "Pearl Fishers" by Bizet. Sophie gently and powerfully sang that most haunting song Le Spectre de la rose from the Berlioz song cycle "Nuits d'Eté". They finished with the Brindisi from "La Traviata" by Verdi. Although a dank, cold November night, the church was packed. They hoped to raise about £2000.00.

(Personally, I was so inspired by the cause I wondered why we might not try and do something similar in Benson?)

Advent begins on 1st December. It is a month B i n g o N i g h t ! that not only includes Christmas and several

around here – his shrine originally was in Dorchester Abbey; his name in Anglo Saxon was Berin, hence Berinsfield. His feast will be kept on 3rd December. Music will include a mass setting by Palestrina. Mozart's Mass in D, K.194 will feature at Midnight Mass and at Mass of Christmas Day. Composed at Salzburg, this was the first of Mozart's masses to be published after his death in 1794. Then Sebastiano's Missa Salve Sancta Parens will feature at Mass on 1st January.

The composer for December is Phillipe de Monte and for January, Philippe Rogier. The latter is an example of how history's accidents change perceptions - although highly regarded in his lifetime and a principal composer of the chapel of Philip II, he wrote both sacred and secular music, however, most of his considerable musical output was lost in 1755 during the Lisbon earthquake when fire destroyed the vast Library of John IV. Rogier's surviving works are all very much of the mood music of the Hapsburg chapel in Flanders which had such influence over the English composers Tallis, Byrd and Parsons. Indeed, the December composer Philippe de Monte spent some time in England under Mary I. He wrote music for the chapel of Philip and Mary and some of his music may have been used at the marriage of the Queen and King in Winchester in July 1554. Later he served the Regent in the Netherlands and also as kapellmeister to Maximillian II, whose wife you may recall from last month was herself patron to Tomas Luis de Victoria.

De Monte was also a composer of sacred and secular music and composed settings for 1100 madrigals and these were published from 1554 with personal notes and dedications to his various patrons. This idea was later taken up in Elizabethan England where collections of madrigals or poems are dedicated to patrons. In December we will have three of his masses: Missa ad te levavi; Missa Ultimi miei sospiri; Missa Benedicta es: Miss acara la vita. There will be motets by Asola; Guerrero; Baccusi; Victoria and Wert. Christmas day will feature a Haydn Mass and Propers from the Gradualia of William Byrd. The Phillipe Rogier, Missa inclita stirps Jesse will feature for Epiphany on Sunday 5th January.

Quite often when I lead children's groups in church I try and teach through the medium of a recipe. It's particularly fun to do at this time of year, because it means I can pull out my old favourite church cake recipe, 'A Birthday Cake for Jesus'. It goes something like this:

1. Cream together 50 grams of soft butter, and 4 tbsp dark sugar. (The whiteness of the butter reminds us of the PURITY of the new born Christ-child, and the sugar reminds us of the SWEETNESS he brings to our lives.)

2. Beat in 1 egg. (The egg reminds us that the Christ-child came to bring us NEW LIFE at Easter, and as we beat it we remember that Christ was stricken for our transgressions.)

3. Fold in 4 tbsp of flour. (Flour reminds us that Jesus came to be for us the BREAD OF LIFE, the one in whom all our hungers are satisfied.)

4. Mix in ¹/₄ tsp each of ground cinnamon, allspice, and nutmeg. (The spices, which come from the East, remind us of the gifts that the wise men from the East brought to the infant Jesus at Epiphany: GOLD, FRANKINCENSE, and MYRRH.)

5. Stir through a pinch of salt. (The salt reminds us of the TEARS OF SORROW

Jesus wept over his friend Lazarus at his death, and the tears Jesus weeps over us at our departing, too.)

6. Fold in 200g mixed fruit. (Fruit reminds us that Jesus' death bore the fruit of RESURRECTION, and won for us the right to bear the same fruit.)

7. Mix in $\frac{1}{2}$ tbsp of rum. (The liquor reminds us that after he ascended to heaven, the Risen Jesus sent us the gift of his HOLY SPIRIT that we might live his risen life.)

8. Bake. (The heat of the oven reminds us that there will be suffering in this life; but the finished cake at the end of it reminds us that at the end of our suffering we will have been transformed into something fragrant for Christ.)

9. Decorate with white icing. (The icing reminds us that when we are raised with Christ we will put on WHITE ROBES as we praise God in heaven for all eternity.)

I suspect many others in the village will have their own favourite Christmas recipes – but this is one of mine! Whatever you find yourself cooking up this winter, Fr Stephen and I pray that you will have a very happy Christmas, and that you may know the peace and joy of the Christ-child in your home.

The yule cake dotted thick wi plumbs Is on each supper table found And cats look up for falling crumbs W hich greedy childern litter round And huswifes sage stuffd seasond chine Long hung in chimney nook to drye And boiling eldern berry wine To drink the christmas eves 'good bye' (Anne Bronte)

The Victorians rebranded Christmas so successfully that it is easy to forget there ever was any other way of celebrating the festival. Their stamp is on our Christmas cards where Christmases are forever white; sparkling steepled churches with ruddy faced choristers; merry gentlemen carolling their glad tidings. A snowy world of wrens and robins, ivy, fir trees and holly berries and ice skaters...

Ideal Victorian tables groaned with turkeys; capons; geese; ducks and pheasants; pork pies; pickles and smoked hams and seasoned chine; plum puddings; sherry trifles; Turkish delight; boxes of dates and boxes of chocolates; tins of biscuits and tins of toffees – oranges, and apples and the obligatory bowl of nuts with its nut-cracker - the dreaded nutcracker so ill-suited for its supposed purpose. This was the paraphernalia of the Victorians season of twelve days of feasting.

Even in its time it was some distance from the bleak mid-winters of the bitterly divided Palestine of the Roman occupation. Its emphasis on plenty was further yet from the comfortless search of Bethlehem by Joseph and Mary for somewhere safe and secure to have their child; in desperation making do sharing a bare stable with its domestic animals; after the child is born placing him in his make-shift manger-crib. Their world as racked by poverty and displacement as ours today.

Our times own their own paraphernalia: office parties; the great expectations no presents can truly fulfil; the sales that now start before a single present is opened; and an iridescence of Christmas lights that remakes our streetscapes for a few weeks. As I write the shops in the village have Christmas windows already and many of our houses will shortly be bedecked with lights outside and inside; reindeer; stars; and many Santas. I like this festival of lights and hereabouts in all the villages there is comfort and joy that the dark winding paths on our darkest nights are alight and alive in defiance at the lightless days of winter.

Another part of Village Christmas is the Bensington Society Christmas Party. It will take place on Friday 13th December at the Benson Village Hall. We will welcome friends and visitors to join the fun and there will be plenty of good cheer on offer from the bar and the supper price remains at £5 but includes a glass of mulled wine. There is always a wonderful raffle with a cornucopia of prizes which you never know may successfully resolve some present Christmas present conundrum or other pressing Christmas need. Our entertainment will come from James Mitchell and Oliver James who are performing their Flanagan and Allen tribute act in the form of a sing-along.

With Christmas in view please remember the various books on Village past and present that you can obtain via the Bensington Society Web site: www.bensington-society.com. An annual society membership would make a great present too!

The Web Page will shortly be updated with the full program of talks and outings for next year. The talks will include Karl Bird -Misadventures in Movie Locations on 31st January 2020; Nicholas Brazil - Literary and Artistic footprints in the Thames Valley - on 28th February; and Prof Tony Claydon - William III: the Making of Modern Britain – on 27th March 2020.

Please note the Society AGM will be on 27th February although memberships will be renewed at the January meeting as usual. As the AGM is later the Annual Report will not go out to members until early February.

This year marks my fifth Christmas in the village. I'm still very much a newcomer here but I've always felt part of this community. In my short time here, there have been many changes and with the housing developments proceeding apace there are many changes to come. At the heart of our community are schools, shops, pubs, Marina, library, churches, GP surgery, dentist, vets and the many village clubs and societies, all bound together in the monthly bulletin. Their part in the life of Benson makes this village a special place. This is made visible particularly on our Remembrance Day ceremonies but also in the pre-Christmas carolling and concerts.

For all we seem further than ever from those origins of Christmas, year on year we are



reminded of the importance of community and of community endeavours in this village we are lucky enough to call home.

Christmas enables us to return to the flame of child-like wonder we hold in our hearts. It is that place that links us to those events in Palestine where startled shepherds were keeping watch over their flocks at night when a tumult of angels from another world brought tidings of great joy and good will to all people and a mysterious star appeared in the night sky pointing the way to a caravan of Kings from Persian lands afar.

Big Benson Tree Plant at Warwick Spinney

Although the talk scheduled for November had to be postponed till some time next year, there was no rest for Benson Nature Group. Plans were well advanced for the Big Benson Tree Plant at Warwick Spinney on Sunday 10th November. The BNG publicity machine had gone into full swing with posters in strategic locations throughout the village, postings on social media and informal communications via the village grapevine. Trees and mulch were ordered and the planting area marked out. Arrangements were made for first aid and a risk assessment was carried out. And, most importantly, tea and cakes were organised for participants.

Despite a miserable lead-up in the preceding days, the weather turned up trumps – soaking wet on the previous day to soften the ground

and a glorious, sunny and mild winter day for the planting.

Improvements to Warwick Spinney, a community green space owned by Benson Community Association and managed by BNG, are being funded by a grant from a local charity, The Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment (TOE). The Woodland Trust also provided some trees as part of their national Big Climate Fight Back Campaign where one million people have pledged to plant a tree.

The activity started with a briefing from Edel McGurk on the background to the project, its context within the parish nature strategy, and the health and safety "dos" and "don'ts". This was followed by a demonstration by Tom Stevenson on how to plant a sapling – use a spade to slice a hole in the ground; place the tree in it; heel it in; put a supporting cane next to it; wrap a plastic sleeve around sapling and cane to prevent rabbit damage and finally spread some mulch around it. In all, 300 trees of 10 different native varieties (eg Rowan, Oak, Maple, Buckthorn, Malus) together with 500 English bluebells were planted in double quick time due to the excellent turnout.

In total, around 80 volunteers, including 20 children, took part in what was universally acclaimed to be a very enjoyable and successful community event. And the tea and delicious home-made cakes went down a treat at the end of the hard work.

Our special thanks to two new members of the BNG Project Team, Chris Hartshorne for his creative posters advertising the event and to Fiona Brown for organising the catering. Also, to Imogen Parker for the risk assessment, Helen Stevenson for acting as first aider and Jon Fowler for the signage and photos. And as ever, a big thank you to Tom for all the practical work in getting the site ready as well as ensuring the trees arrived on time and to Edel for her tireless planning to make sure it all went right on the night.

With BNG increasing its commitments to manage our green spaces, more volunteers are needed, particularly to help with the practical work. If you enjoyed the Big Benson Tree Plant, whether you have lots or only a little spare time, please let Tom (Thomas. stevenson@ntlworld.com) know if you would like to volunteer for similar future activities. We'd love to see you, and it will help us to plan resource for our future commitments.



I think the return fare was an old "Thrupenny Bit". I can't work out what that is in modern money.

As to Winch Meadow, yes Peter is right. It was a wildlife paradise. The birdlife was fantastic, along with newts, frogs, snakes and butterflies. We used to have nature visits with our Cubs and Scout teachers. I can't remember their names.

The fishing there was also wonderful. My Uncle Cyril was a very keen fisherman, and he often took me with him. I can remember him catching very large carp and also big eels, which were plentiful then. As Peter said, it was a wildlife paradise that should never have been built on.


Preston Crowmarsh's Most Famous Author?



John Kilian Houston Brunner

How many readers will have heard of a famous novelist and poet born in Preston Crowmarsh?

In his day, John Kilian Houston Brunner was famous for his Sci-Fi novels, winning the prestigious Hugo prize in 1969 for "Stand on Zanzibar". In this novel on overpopulation, Brunner predicted, amongst other things, computer viruses, generic engineering and Viagra. He was born in 1934 and was the son of Anthony & Amy Felicity Brunner, who lived in the Old Mill House in the 1930's. They were well known locally, with Mrs Brunner organising annual tennis tournaments on their own court in 1934 & 1935. They were also a celebrity couple – Anthony being a well known racing driver and his wife a famous ex-model. A cousin of Anthony's – Sir Felix Brunner – lived at Grey's Court in Henley, whilst his brother Patrick O'Brian Brunner lived in Dorchester



However. the Brunner family were already famous - or infamous - for other Anthony reasons. was the grandson of Sir John T Brunner. founder the of Brunner Mund & Co one of the world's largest chemical companies.

Anthony's father Roscoe Brunner inherited the company, but when the Government of the day encouraged the four major British chemical companies to combine into the giant ICI in December 1926, Roscoe Brunner was to be side lined and not given a place on the Board of Directors.

The Brunner family were very well connected with Royalty, not only with the Palace, but also with his sister married to the Prince of Liechtenstein; there were connections politically also, with two MPs in the family. Hence quite a political storm blew up over Roscoe's exclusion from ICI. However on 3rd November 1926 both Roscoe Brunner and his wife Ethel were found dead from gunshot wounds.

The police reported to the Coroner that Roscoe Brunner had shot his wife and then committed suicide whilst suffering from depression. The press had a field day, with heavy hints in the papers of foul play by persons unknown and of an inept police investigation that was manipulated in some way. The storm was not helped by the Government locking away all the relevant papers under the 100 year rule, along with other State & Royal papers.

Anthony & Amy Felicity Brunner along with their children appear to have left Preston Crowmarsh around 1938, to take over the Manor House in Towersey near Thame. John Kilian Brunner's novels became less popular in the 1970's and before his death, most of his books had fallen out of print. Brunner accused publishers of a conspiracy against him. But he was known to be difficult to deal with (his wife Marjorie Brunner had handled his publishing relations before she died).

He died of a heart attack in Glasgow on 25 August 1995, while attending the World Science Fiction Convention.

We had a most interesting workshop in October with Harwell based artist, Carolyn Tyrer, who has been to us before. Carolyn has her own very individual style but she is also a good tutor. Our subject was animals and, using the whiteboard in the Watercress Centre (which turned out to be a godsend) she showed us how she built up the forms of each animal using very simple shapes – circles, squares, oblongs and triangles. Some great work was produced and we had a fun afternoon.

We welcomed Robert Kidner, our favourite amateur art historian from the Wallingford Art Group back on 11 November for a fascinating talk on Art and the Landscape. This was of particular interest as the majority of us do like to paint views. Robert took us through the various art movements – Romanticism, Realism, Impressionism and Surrealism featuring various artists who represented each era. John Constable's famous painting of Flatford Mill and Turner's Norman Castle at Sunrise, represented the Romantic period, while Jean Francois Millet's "The Gleaners" was an example of the Realism period. Van Gogh's wonderful 'Starry Night', Monet's 'Sunrise' and Sisley's delightful rural landscapes were all painted in an impressionistic style. Dali was, of course, the main representative of the surrealist period. Paul Nash, early 20th century, used to paint Wittenham Clumps when he came to Brightwell cum Sotwell to stay with his uncle. After he was sent home injured from the war and his sketches were discovered, he was sent back out as a war artist to record the scenes of devastation during World War 1.
